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INTRODUCTION. Yizkor is a time set aside to formally include in our thoughts and prayers family and friends who have passed away. Though Yizkor is recited on each of the festivals, on the High Holy Days we may feel a special connection to those who have played a significant role in our life's journey. The themes and somber ambience of the Yom Kippur service make this day especially appropriate for contemplating life and death. Thus, in reciting Yizkor, the veil between the worlds of the living and the dead becomes more transparent, less opaque. May the memory of those we recall be a blessing in our lives.

WHAT ARE HUMAN BEINGS

TZ'DAKAH/CHARITY צְדָקָה

The Yizkor service was called *seder matnat yad*, the service of expressing generosity on behalf of those who have died. That name comes from the closing line of the Torah reading for the final day of the pilgrimage festivals (when Yizkor is recited): “Every person giving a gift according to the blessing they have received from Adonai” (Deuteronomy 16:17). Offering charitable gifts and performing acts of justice, love, and care in memory of those who have died provide us with ways of honoring their memory and continuing their influence for good.

We Recall

Some of us recall parents who watched over us, nursed us, guided us, and sacrificed for us.

Some of us lovingly call to mind a wife, husband, or partner with whom we were truly united—in our hopes and our pains, in our failures and our achievements, in our joys and our sorrows.

Some of us remember brothers and sisters, who grew up together with us, sharing in the play of childhood, in the youthful adventure of discovering life's possibilities, bound to us by a heritage of family tradition and by years of togetherness and love.

Some of us call to mind children, entrusted to us too briefly, to whom we gave our loving care and from whom we received a trust that enriched our lives.

So many of us recall beloved relatives and friends whose affection and devotion enhanced our lives, and whose visible presence will never return to cheer, encourage, or support us.

Though they are gone, we are grateful for the blessings they brought to our lives. We are sustained and comforted by the thought that their presence in our lives remains an enduring blessing that we can bequeath to others.

We can show our devotion to them by our devotion to those ideas that they cherished.

O God of love, make us worthy of the love we have received by teaching us to love You with all our heart and with all our soul and with all our might, and to spread the light of Your divine love on all whose lives touch ours.

Give us strength to live faithfully, for we are cheered by our confidence that You will not permit our lives to be wasted, but will bring all our worthy strivings to live on, even as we may not see their fulfillment.

Dear God,

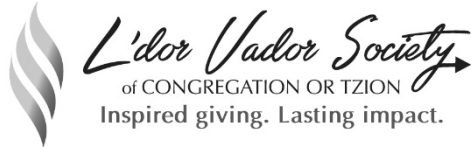

Here, very briefly, are the stories of our parents who have passed away:

My parents, Miriam and Eliazer Gryziak, each escaped from Poland to Russia in 1939. My father was drafted into a Polish division of the Russian Army. My mother found work in an agricultural settlement in Uzbekistan, where she worked in the fields. After the war, they both returned to Poland where they met and married. In 1956 the Hungarian Revolution made it possible to leave Poland and make Aliya to Israel. My father passed away shortly after we arrived in Israel at age 51. My mother and her brother found each other through pure chance (and some good old fashioned "Jewish geography") in 1969. My Uncle Sam, who she believed had died in the Holocaust, was found alive and well living in Denver, Colorado. My mother never remarried and lived to age 83 near Tel Aviv.

My father, Rolf Lange, left Berlin with his father on April 12, 1936 to scope out "Plan B" in case the situation in Germany continued to deteriorate. They made their departure look like they were going on vacation, but in fact were looking for a place to live in the Jewish homeland, then called Palestine. While on this "vacation" the situation in Germany worsened and my father never returned to Germany. His initial work was picking oranges near Hadera. Later he and a friend purchased a taxi. Their enterprise ended early and abruptly when the taxi took a direct hit from an Italian bomber, killing his friend and destroying the taxi along with his livelihood. My father emigrated to the United States in 1941 He married my mother in Minneapolis and remained there until they retired from the furniture business. They moved to Hollywood, Florida where he passed away at age 83.

My brother was passionate about three things - Food, Sports and later in life, his nephew, Jacob.

- **Food was very important to him**—Joshua was a creature of habit. Being from the Philly suburbs, he was happy if he had his Snyder’s pretzels, Cherry Twizzles (slightly stale), Canada Dry Ginger Ale, an Italian hoagie, and a Tastykake Cherry Pie. Throw in either my mom’s or my late Aunt Phyllis’ holiday cooking and he was golden! Here’s a favorite memory that combines all three: When the Eagles were in the Super Bowl in 2019, he and Jacob came up with a shopping list for the big game because, as he taught Jacob, the food you eat to watch the game is AS IMPORTANT as the game itself. And the Eagles won the Superbowl! It was a fantastic day in our home!
- **He was blessed with natural athletic ability**- At age 3, my mom bought him a whiffle ball and bat and instinctively he knew how to hit the ball. That was a shock to his non-athletic family. Josh could pick up any sport item and figure it out. He played little league until age 13 when we moved to Israel. There, he picked up rugby and soccer. He loved street hockey and basketball, bike riding and even roller blading. Later, he taught himself tennis.

But his greatest sports passion was golf. He learned about the origin story of Tiger Woods, and he went out to our local golf club and taught himself how to play at age 27 . . . and he was good. He was happiest on a golf course. On my shelf are two first place trophies and three “hole in ones” that he chose to hang on to all these years. He was able to golf at TPC and Pebble Beach. In fact, though in deep pain, he did golf the TPC one last time a few days before his passing.

- **He was the greatest uncle in the world**—From the moment we told Josh he was going to be an uncle he was beyond excited—all the fun of having a child without ANY RESPONSIBILITY! Jacob and Uncle Josh took to each other immediately. To Josh’s dismay, he learned he did not have another Tiger Woods on his hands, so he taught Jacob about other American sports and how to use his left arm abilities to his advantage. They swam all summer long in the pool, carved pumpkins in the fall, we spent Chanukah and Jacob’s birthday together in December and Josh oversaw all the kids during seder in the spring—he would take them outside to play basketball. He was Fun Uncle Josh.

It’s been over two years since Josh’s passing and Jacob is finally excited about golf (you should see his swing!) He has his uncle’s clubs ready to use when he starts lessons, and his goal is to outshine his uncle’s record. Nothing would make my brother happier or prouder than seeing his nephew surpass him.
